We will also commemorate International Day of Prayer for Peace in worship, with a special litany at 9:00 and a participatory Roll of Remembrance at 11:15. You are invited to read James 3:1-6 and to ponder ways to promote peace in our words as we prepare for this worship experience.

***Home By Another Way*** by Barbara Brown Taylor

In this selection of new sermons, Barbara Brown Taylor's gift of storytelling brings new life to scripture stories across the church year from Advent to Pentecost. Consider this brief sample: "Once upon a time there were three very wise men who were all minding their own business when a bright star lodged in the right eye of each one, so bright that none of them could tell whether it was burning in the sky or in their own imaginations, but they knew it did not matter all that much. The point was, something beyond them was calling them, and it was a tug they had been waiting for all their lives." This class will explore Taylor's tellings of familiar stories to call us home by another way.

***Misquoting Jesus, The Story Behind Who Changed the Bible and Why***  
by Bart Ehrman.  
Facilitated by Terry Dougherty and Dave Wysong

World-renowned biblical scholar Ehrman reveals the truth behind mistakes and changes found throughout the Bible, including:

- The King James Bible was based on inferior manuscripts that in many cases do not accurately represent the meaning of the original text.
- The favorite story of Jesus forgiving the woman caught in adultery (John 8:3-11) does not belong in the Bible.
- Scriptural errors were so common in antiquity that the author of the Book of Revelation threatened damnation to anyone who "adds to" or "takes away" words from the text.
